

December – We will work on Make and Take It projects that can be used as ornaments, gift tags, or lapel pins. Samples were shown at the November meeting and a rough count taken, but if you weren't at the meeting, or changed your mind, we'll have extras.

The choices are: Yo-Yos  
Felted Wool Applique  
Appli-quilting  
English Paper Piecing

Kits will be available and will include instruction sheet, picture, templates, fabric, needle and threads.

You will need to bring: \$1 to cover the cost of the kit  
Small scissors (to cut fabric, thread and paper)  
Thimble if you like to use on for hand work

This will be a great chance to practice a new technique and create a new seasonal item.

- Unfinished projects
- Tools and rulers
- Fabric – yardage, fat-quarters, or bags of scraps
- Quilt tops

**International Quilt Festival  
Houston, Texas**

I was one of the lucky ducks that attended this year's International Quilt Festival in Houston, Texas. If you have never been to festival, save your pennies and attend. It is a fabulous show and this year was especially good because all the renovations and improvements to the George R Brown Convention Center are complete, plus the addition of the Hilton Hotel next door to the Convention Center. The hotel is connected to the Convention Center by a skywalk, plus the hotel has a parking garage. You could spend an entire week there and never go outside! However, I wouldn't recommend that. Houston is a bustling and interesting city with lots to offer.

There were several Oklahoma women that were juried into the show. We also had some of our own Edmond gals that had quilts in special exhibits. Laura James, our secretary, had little quilts in the Journal Quilt Exhibit, which is a personal look at quilting from an individual's point of view. She also had a quilt in the Viking sponsored Women of Biblical Proportions. Laura's lady of the Bible is Phoebe. Also, in that exhibit is a quilt by Marilu Benton, Mary Mother of Jesus. The curator and quilter of Potiphar's Wife and Tomar is Ruth Harris.

The winners of the competitive quilts were so beautiful, you forgot they were quilts. Best of Show was a quilt named "Precious Water" by Hollis Chatelain. Of course, there were a few vendors and I tried to keep my distance, but it was difficult. There were so many pretty fabrics, threads, buttons, beads, jewelry, paints, dyes and even the batts were pretty. Hobbs has come out with a pure black batting to replace the charcoal color they once had. The latest color in rulers is light green. They almost glow!

My classes were fun. One was a painting class and we just played for half a day and had fun with stencils and brushes. Another was a perspective class where you used fabric to give a 3-dimensional look. She also used paint and pens to manipulate the fabric to give it a unique look. My last class was a design class and I learned so much. I will be able to use her techniques in my future art quilts.

If you couldn't tell from this article, I had a great time in Houston and recommend that if you have not gone before, that you plan to attend someday. It is the biggest and the best and only next door in Texas.
